TIME AND SEASONS

LADIES DISCUSSION GROUP

The atmosphere is informal and relaxed and we finish at 11.30 to collect children from the creche which is provided at a nearby home. We couldn't say we've found all the answers, but we are seeing how God does care about us and is ready to answer prayer.

NEWS FROM THE CURATE'S LODGE

There seems to be very little training for parenthood apart from the example and memories of our own parents. Yet as parents we have the responsibility of shaping the lives of the next generation. In our own individual way we are involved in forming the world of the future. No mean task!

To a large extent they adopt or reject the examples and views of parents, just as we did, often without really examining those views at all. These attitudes are not really the sort of thing which can be taught in our schools, but they are closely bound up with belief and faith. How are we going to equip the next generation to answer questions about marriage and divorce, surrogate motherhood and abortion, war and euthanasia, poverty and wealth?

There is talk of making Religious Education an option in schools, thus putting the full weight of responsibility for a balanced input on parents and the church. As the church on Heatherside, we welcome you and your children to share with us in discovering a faith which gives shape to our lives and teaches God's ways as shown in the Bible.
